











Advent = "coming"

We use it to refer to the coming of Jesus.













Advent: Preparing For the Incarnation


Incarnation so important that is part of our Nicene Creed that we say on Sundays and solemnities.

"He came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man."









There are always four Sundays of Advent.
Advent begins on the first Sunday




- Epiphany is celebrated on the Sunday closest to January 6th (12 days of Christ)
- The Baptism of the Lord is generally the Sunday after Epiphany and ends the Christmas season




Advent: Preparing For the Incarnation

Advent's Place in the Liturgical Year

- Easter is #1, Christmas #2, but Advent marks the start of the liturgical year in the church
- Advent is time to prepare us for the coming of Jesus
- Advent wreaths are used to mark the passage of the four weeks
- Early in Advent, the readings first focus on the Second Coming. As we get closer to Christmas, our readings turn to the first coming of Jesus.

Why did Jesus become Incarnate?

John 3:16 – "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life."



Why did Jesus become Incarnate? (cont'd)

"For John, the purpose of the Incarnation of the Word was more than becoming flesh to take on our human nature. The Incarnation also embraced Jesus' Death and Resurrection—the Paschal Mystery—whose life-giving effects would nourish believers in the celebration of the Eucharist" (At Home with the Word 2018, 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B, 119).

Why did Jesus become Incarnate? (cont'd)

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B - Hebrews 4:14-16

"Brothers and sisters: Since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has similarly been tested in every way, yet without sin. So let us confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and to find grace for timely help."



Why did Jesus become Incarnate? (cont'd)

Compendium to Catechism Questions 85


"Why did the Son of God become man?

For us men and for our salvation, the Son of God became incarnate in the womb of the Virgin Mary by the power of the Holy Spirit. He did so to reconcile us sinners with God, to have us learn of God's infinite love, to be our model of holiness and to make us "partakers of the divine nature" (2 Peter 1:4)."



Why did Jesus become Incarnate? (cont'd)

Romans 5:8 – "But God proves his love for us that in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us."





Why did Jesus become Incarnate? (cont'd)

Quotes from the Catechism of the Catholic Church

- "461.Taking up St. John's expression, "The Word became flesh, the Church calls "Incarnation" the fact that the Son of God assumed a human nature in order to accomplish our salvation in it."
- "521. Christ enables us to live in him all that he himself lived, and he lives in us. "By his Incarnation, he, the Son of God, has in a certain way united himself with each man."



Advent: Preparing For the Incarnation

The Incarnation and the Sacraments

God knows that, as humans, we relate better to things we can see in touch. Therefore, in the sacraments, God makes us of things to make us aware of his grace coming upon us.

Examples:

- Eucharist Bread and wine become Jesus' Body & Blood
- The remainder are symbols
 - Baptism water, oil
 - Confirmation oil, laying of hands
 - Anointing of the Sick oil



"Our salvation has come about through the Incarnation of the Son of God into the real world of sinful human beings. The Church - as the Body of Christ - must, as a result of Christ's incarnation, itself be incarnational: it is *and must* be present in the real world in and through its all too human, sinful, and fallen members."

(Berg, Hurting in the Church, 155)



Advent: Preparing For the Incarnation

"Today we help form Christ's body and presence on earth. The Incarnation is not an experiment that ended when Christ, in us. It is up to us to actualize Christ's presence on earth. And we must actualize the whole Christ: his word, his healing powers, his reconciliation, his death and resurrection, and his loneliness. Just as the passion and crucifixion of Christ continue until the end of the world in those who suffer, so, too, the loneliness of Christ continues in all those who are lonely."
