What Does the Catechism Say About Prayer?

Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2559 "Prayer is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God" (original quote – St. John Damascene, De fide orth 3, 24:PG 94, 1089C).

Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2567
"In prayer, the faithful <u>God's initiative</u> of love always comes first; our <u>own first step is always a response</u>" (my emphasis)

Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

A – Adoration

- "Humility is the foundation of prayer" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2559).
- "This form of prayer flows from an attitude that acknowledges we are creatures in the presence of our Creator. It is an act by which we glorify the God who made us. We adore God from whom all blessings flow" (United States Catholic Catechism for Adults, 467).

Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

C- Contrition

- Citing the Council of Trent, the Catechism of the Catholic Church defines contrition as "sorrow of the soul and detestation for the sin committed, together with the resolution not to sin again" (1451, original quote Council of Trent (1551): DS 1676).
- Thus, like adoration, contrition requires humility
- We must admit our sinfulness to let God help and forgive us.

Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

C- Contrition cont'd Psalm 51: 3-6a

Have mercy on me, God, in accord with your merciful love; in your abundant compassion blot out my transgressions. Thoroughly wash away my guilt;

and from my sin cleanse me.
For I know my transgressions;

my sin is always before me.
Against you, you alone have I sinned;

I have done what is evil in your eyes.





Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

C- Contrition cont'd
Psalm 51: 18-19
For you do not desire sacrifice or I would give it;
a burnt offering you would not accept.
My sacrifice, O God, is a contrite spirit;
a contrite, humbled heart, O God, you will not scorn.

Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

- S- Supplication
- Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2629 "The vocabulary of supplication in the New Testament is rich in shades of meaning: ask, beseech, plead, invoke, entreat, cry out, even "struggle in prayer.""
- We pray (offer supplication) when we need something. However, in the acronym, ACTS, note that Adoration, Contrition, and Thanksgiving come first. Then comes supplication.

Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

- T Thanksgiving
- We ask God for help when we need something
 → we should thank God when He helps us
- In all our prayers, we should pray with an "attitude of gratitude."
- In the New American Bible Revised Edition, 18 different psalms are specifically identified as psalms of thanksgiving in the first verse.
- The word "eucharist" means "thanksgiving."

Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

- S- Supplication cont'd
- "Petition This is a prayer that takes many forms: to ask, to implore, to plead, to cry out. In each case, it acknowledges how much we depend on God for our needs, including forgiveness and persistence in seeking him" (United States Catholic Catechism for Adults, 467).
- "Intercession This is the prayer that we make on behalf of the needs of others" (United States Catholic Catechism for Adults, 468)





Four Types of Prayer A-C-T-S

- S- Supplication cont'd
- Any psalm can include more than one of these A-C-T-S
 - For instance, Psalm 51 is a psalm of contrition. It also includes petition. For example:
 - "in your abundant compassion blot out my transgressions. Thoroughly wash away my guilt; and from my sin cleanse me" (Psalm 51:3b-4).

When to Pray

- How about spontaneously? (tie to pray without ceasing)
 - Just because
 - · When we hear something bad
 - · When we receive good news

In Matthew 17:20, we hear Jesus say to his disciples, "Because of your little faith. Amen, I say to you, if you have faith the size of a **mustard seed**, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you."

Does this mean we have "little faith" if our prayers are not answered?

What Does It Mean for God to Answer Our Prayers?

Sometimes God says no

"And I tell you, ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks, receives; and the one who seeks, finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened. What father among you would hand his son a snake when he asks for a fish? Or hand him a scorpion when he asks for an egg? If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the Father in heaven give the holy Spirit to those who ask him?" (Luke 11:9-13).

Jesus as Model of Prayer

- · Agony in the Garden
 - · Not my will but yours be done
 - Mark 14:36, Matthew 26:39, 42, 44, Luke 22:42
 - "Prayer cannot be reduced to the spontaneous outpouring of interior impulse: in order to pray, one must have the <u>will</u> to pray" (CCC, 2650).



Giving Our Hearts to God: What It Means to Pray, Part II



Jesus as Model of Prayer

- Jesus went off to pray
 - · Jesus prayed at important moments
 - His Baptism Luke 3:21
 - Before sending out the Twelve Luke 6:12
 - Before Peter's confession about Jesus' identity Luke 9:18
 - Transfiguration Luke 9:28
- Jesus did not simply pray for himself "Simon, Simon, behold Satan has demanded to sift all of you like wheat, <u>but I have</u> <u>prayed that your own faith may not fail</u>" (Luke 22:31-32).

(see Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2600)

Mary as Model of Prayer

- Annunciation Mary questioned but said yes
 - Mary's question vs. Zechariah's doubt (Luke 1:5-25, esp. v18 "Then Zechariah said to the angel, "How should I know this? For I am an old man, and my wife is advanced in years."
- Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55) Mary gives the glory to God.
