







Webinar Tips

- In addition to the slides, you should see a video of me. It should appear in the upper right of your screen. It should not block any significant content on the slides. If it does, you can drag it around.










Why Pray?






The Meaning Behind the Words

Prayer can involve saying the words of prayers that we have memorized. However, good prayer is <u>not</u> just about <u>saying</u> the words. We need to reflect on what they mean.










Distractions

- Are they inevitable?
- Jacob's wrestling (Gen 32:24-30)
 - What thoughts are distractions and what thoughts are something we need to pray about?
- Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2729 "To set about hunting down distractions would be to fall into their trap, when all that is necessary is turn back to our heart: for a distraction reveals to us what we are attached to."



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Tips for Dealing with Distractions

- The Devil is cunning. He knows how to distract us.
- Fighting thoughts vs. letting them pass
- Minimizing distractions
 - Having a special place for prayer (prayer corner)
 - Remove distracting items
 - People know not to interrupt us
- Centering prayer





Dryness in Prayer

- Mother Teresa
 - People assumed prayer was easy for her but her journals revealed she spent years in dryness.
- Are we not able to pray or do we not perceive our prayer?
 - Prayer can become routine. As such it no longer provides the same fire.
 - Addiction we need more of what we are addicted to in order to achieve the same effect (Gerard G. May, Addiction & Grace: Love and Spirituality in the Healing of Addictions. New York: Harper One. 1988).

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




From the evaluations "History of Prayer"

Devotions - St. Michael Chaplet - 9 invocations

- 6. By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Virtues, may the Lord preserve us from evil and suffer us not to fall into temptation. Amen.
- By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Principalities, may God fill our souls with a true spirit of <u>obedience</u>. Amen.
- 8. By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Archangels, may the Lord give us <u>perseverance</u> in faith and in all good works, in order that we gain the glory of Paradise. Amen.
- By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Angels, may the Lord grant us to be protected by them in this mortal life and conducted hereafter to eternal glory. Amen.






Forms

Devotions - St. Michael Chaplet - 9 invocations

- By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Seraphim, may the Lord make us worthy to burn with the fire of perfect <u>charity</u>. Amen.
- 2. By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Cherubim, may the Lord vouchsafe to grant us grace to leave the ways of wickedness to run in the paths of Christian perfection. Amen.
- By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Thrones, may the Lord infuse into our hearts a true and sincere spirit of <u>humility</u>. Amen.
- 4. By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Dominions, may the Lord give us grace to govern our senses and subdue our unruly passions. Amen
- 5. By the intercession of St. Michael and the celestial Choir of Powers, may the Lord vouchsafe to protect our souls against the snares and temptations of the devil. Amen.

- What I said in Part I about the Serenity Prayer, Foucauld's Prayer of Abandonment...not just saying words






Forms – Meditation

St. Charles Borromeo on the importance of meditation "My brothers, you must realize that for us churchmen nothing is more necessary than meditation. <u>We must meditate before,</u> <u>during and after everything we do.</u> The prophet says: I will pray, and then I will understand. When you administer the sacraments, meditate on what you are doing. When you celebrate Mass, reflect on the sacrifice you are offering. When you pray the office, think about the words you are saying and the Lord to whom you are speaking. When you take care of your people, meditate on how the Lord's blood that has washed them clean. So that all that you do becomes a work of love."

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


Forms - Litanies


- DeLorenzo writes in his new book, *Model of Faith: Reflecting on the Litany of Saint Joseph*, "The Litany of Saint Joseph takes us down a path of contemplation. We are led to contemplate the titles and honors of Joseph, husband of Mary and the custodian of the Incarnate Word. To contemplate Joseph requires that we contemplate the mysteries of God" (14).




Prayers Found in Scripture The Eucharistic Prayers - Consecration

Mark 14:22-24 Luke 22:14-20 Cf. I Corinthians 11:23-25



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





Some Closing Thoughts cont'd
