

# USCCB, The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church

"55. In recent years, increasing numbers of Christians in our country have left their churches and become religiously unaffiliated. We invite Catholics who have left the Church or who no longer practice the faith to come home. We miss you and we love you. <u>We pray that Jesus will draw you back to</u> your <u>Catholic family</u>, his Mystical Body, through his Eucharistic Body. <u>We repeat words attributed to St. Teresa</u> of <u>Calcutta:</u> "Once you understand the Eucharist, you can never leave the Church. Not because the Church won't let you but because your heart won't let you.""

#### The Witness of Martyrs




# Why Should I Go to Mass (Weekly)?

#### Appreciation of "Mystery"

"The word sacrament also has its origins in the Greek term for "mystery," mysterion. The sense of the term mystery is something <u>unfathomable</u>, something so <u>extraordinary</u> and <u>overwhelming</u> that we can <u>never fully comprehend</u> it. Sacraments are often called "sacred mysteries," not in the sense of problems to be solved, but rather in terms of sacred realities to be immersed in and to be experienced again and again." (Irwin, The Sacraments, 11)










#### Sacraments as Mystery (cont'd)

"The celebration of the sacraments contains the church's agreed-upon and time-tested signs, symbols, gestures, words, and the context in which these are enacted, all of which comprise what sacraments are and do. <u>Words will</u> <u>always fail to describe adequately and fully</u> what sacraments are and do." (Irwin, *The Sacraments*, 2)


#### <u>Please don't let what you don't</u> <u>understand get in the way of the mysteries</u> <u>at play in the Mass.</u>



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


Why Should I Go to Mass (Weekly)?



- Is it just to feel good for an hour?
  - Music, homily...(everyone has different tastes)
- Give praise to God
  - Compendium to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 221 – "In what way is the Father the source and the goal of the liturgy? <u>Through the liturgy the Father</u> <u>fills us</u> with his blessings in the Word made flesh who died and rose for us and pours into our hearts the Holy Spirit. <u>At the same time, the Church blesses</u> <u>the Father by her worship, praise, and</u> <u>thanksgiving and begs him for the gift of his Son</u> <u>and the Holy Spirit.</u>"








Names for the Eucharist Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1328 – 1332

  - Communion vs. community








## **Eucharist as Sacrifice**

Hebrews 5:7-10 – "In the days when he was in the flesh, he offered prayers and supplications with loud cries and tears to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverence. Son though he was, he learned obedience from what he suffered; and when he was made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, declared by God high priest according to the order of Melchizedek."


#### The Catholic Church Did **Not** Invent the Eucharist lesus instituted the Eucharist at the Last


Supper with *his* words, "this is my body...this cup is the new covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you."

Matthew 26:26-28 Mark 14:22-24 Luke 22:14-20 Cf. | Corinthians | 1:23-25












#### The Eucharist is Food for Our Souls

- "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever <u>eats this bread will live forever</u>; and the bread that I will give <u>is my flesh</u> for the life of the world." (John 6:51)
- "Amen, amen, I say to you, <u>unless you eat the flesh of</u> <u>the Son of Man and drink his blood</u>, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is <u>true food</u>, and my blood is <u>true drink</u>." (John 6:53-55)
- "Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, <u>whoever eats</u> <u>this bread will live forever</u>." (John 6:58b)





#### The Eucharist and Real Presence

How can one hear these words and not believe in the Real Presence *instituted by Jesus*?

Yet that is what they do

- "This saying is hard; who can accept it?" (John 6:60b)
- "As a result of this, many [of] his disciples returned to their former way of the life and no longer accompanied him." (John 6:66)

Peter's Response?

 "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." (John 6:68b)

# The Sunday Obligation Remains


Catechism of the Catholic Church, **2180** "The precept of the Church specifies the law of the Lord more precisely: "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation the faithful are bound to participate in the Mass." "The precept of participating in the Mass is satisfied by assistance at a Mass which is celebrated anywhere in a Catholic rite either on the holy day or on the evening of the preceding day."

#### Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2181

"The Sunday Eucharist is the <u>foundation</u> and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are <u>obliged</u> to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless <u>excused for a serious</u> <u>reason (for example, illness, the care of infants)</u> or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin."

Cf. Code of Canon Law, 1245-1248







#### The Obligation is Important

The obligation is important. For example, at times we might visit family in nursing homes more as an obligation than desire.

Fr. Rolheiser – Why does an alcoholic keep going to Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) meetings when he/she hasn't been drinking? He/she goes to keep from drinking (*Our One Great Act of Fidelity*, 77).

→ We shouldn't wait until we fall to come to Mass. We need grace to help keep us from falling.





#### The Sunday Obligation Transcends Our Immediate Gratification

"But families that sustain community also gather regularly, ideally daily, irrespective of whether there is a special occasion or not. They don't just gather when the energy is good, when everyone is at his or her best, when nobody is bored or angry, and when some occasion merits the effort. They come together regularly despite tedium, **boredom**, **low energy, busyness, distractions**, and interpersonal tensions" (Rolheiser, 47, my emphasis).

#### Participation in the Mass During The Scholastic Period

"With regard to the Eucharist, called the "sacrament of sacraments" by many authors, <u>the celebration was done</u> by the priest on behalf of those in attendance ...However, in communities of well-educated monks and mendicants, their participation in the liturgy influenced their understanding of God, the incarnation, and the sacraments." (Irwin, *The* Sacraments, 95) Contrast to today Eucharistic Prayer III –

"at whose command <u>we</u> celebrate these mysteries"

# Active Participation

"The twentieth-century liturgical movement was undoubtedly the main stimulus within the church for the contemporary renewal of the sacramental practice and a revised understanding of the dynamism of the sacramental action. The work of liturgical scholars in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries was responsible for a reawakening of the importance and centrality of liturgy as public worship that, by its nature, required the <u>active participation of all participants</u>." (Irwin, *The Sacraments*, 130).




#### From Obligation to Why We <u>Need</u> the Mass As Part of the Lord's Day



#### Does Livestreaming Fulfill the Sunday Obligation?


This question strikes at the very center of the Eucharistic Revival.

- For those who are *homebound/in nursing homes* Yes!
- · For those who are able to attend in person, livestreaming
  - Misses the community aspect
  - Takes a minimalist approach to Mass
  - You don't receive the Eucharist

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





Who Can Receive the Eucharist?

• Sinners – if one is guilty of mortal sin, healing begins with the Sacrament of Reconciliation

"Therefore whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord <u>unworthily</u> will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord. <u>A person should examine</u> <u>himself</u>, and so eat the bread and drink the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgment on himself" (1 Corinthians 11:27-29, cf. The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church, 48-50. Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1384-1387).





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# Why Should I Go to Mass (Weekly)?

Worthy Reception – Venial Sins

USCCB The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church 45....Venial sins are those sins and <u>everyday faults</u> that, although they reflect a degree of selfishness, <u>do not break the covenant</u> with God. They do not deprive the sinner of friendship with God or of sanctifying grace. <u>Venial sins are not to be taken lightly</u>, but they do not destroy communion because they do not destroy the principle of divine life in us. <u>Indeed, reception of the</u> <u>Eucharist strengthens our charity and wipes away venial sins</u>, while also helping us to avoid more serious sins. Pope Francis brought attention to this medicinal character of the Eucharist when he pointed out that it "is not a prize for the perfect but a powerful medicine and nourishment for the weak.""



# Why Should I Go to Mass (Weekly)?



### Worthy Reception – Mortal Sins

Mortal sins need to be confessed before receiving Communion

- "Therefore, if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go <u>first</u> and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift." (Matthew 5:23-24)
- USCCB, The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church "46. There are some sins, however, that do rupture the communion we share with God and the Church, and that cause grave offense to human dignity. These are referred to as grave, or mortal, sins (see I Jn 5:16-17). One commits a mortal sin by <u>freely, knowingly, and</u> <u>willingly</u> choosing to do something that <u>involves grave matter</u> and that is opposed to charity, opposed to love of God and neighbor."






#### Why Can't Non-Catholics Receive Communion?


Again, we turn to the Old Testament and receive instruction from the Lord himself.

"<u>The LORD</u> said to Moses and Aaron: This is the Passover statute. <u>No foreigner may eat of it</u>. However, every slave bought for money <u>you will circumcise; then he may eat</u> <u>of it</u>... If any <u>alien</u> residing among you would celebrate the Passover for the LORD, all his males <u>must be circumcised</u>, and then he may join in its celebration just like the natives. But no one who is uncircumcised may eat of it" (Exodus 12:43-44,48).












### Why Should You Go to Mass?

- To Praise God
- To receive his Word as told in the Bible
- To join in celebrating Jesus' Sacrifice on the Cross "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).
- Eternal Life "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day" (John 6:54).
- Forgiveness of venial sins

#### Preparing to Receive the Eucharist

- One hour Fast and demeanor at Mass
  - "First, the consumption of the Passover lamb was to be preceded by several hours of fasting, from the time of evening sacrifice (about 3 p.m.)" (Pitre, 150-151).
- Why fast before receiving Communion?
  - Some medicines require an empty stomach
  - Anticipation of what we are to receive, what we hunger for
- Penitential Act and Liturgy of the Word precede the Liturgy of the Eucharist

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




### The Catholic Church Did Not Invent Adoration - Jewish Roots


"Three times in the year shall all your males appear before the LORD God, the God of Israel" (Exodus 34:23, 23:17). According to both the Jerusalem Talmud and Babylonian Talmud, at each of these feasts, the priests in the Temple would do something remarkable. They would remove the Golden Table of the Bread of the Presence from within the Holy Place so that the Jewish pilgrims could see it. When they removed the holy bread, the priest would elevate it..." (Pitre, 130).
